Together with local public health officials, school/district administrators should consult a variety of individuals when making decisions about health and safety in school.

Implementing mitigation activities, responding to periods of increased transmission, resuming baseline level mitigation, and debriefing actions to improve the process

Planning for and implementing proactive health and safety mitigation measures assists schools in reducing Communicable Disease transmission within the school environment for students, staff, and community members. Communicable Disease. Communicable disease, including norovirus,

flu and COVID-19, will continue to circulate in our communities and our schools. Schools will utilize different mitigation measures based on local data, and observation of what is happening in their schools (e.g., transmission within their facilities and communities.) In the following section, teams will document their school's approach to the CDC, OHA and ODE advised health and safety measures at baseline, during increased transmission.

Communicable Disease Mitigating Measures

OHA/ODE Recommendation(s) Layered Health and Safety Measures	Describe what mitigating measures the school will implement to reduce and respond to the spread of Communicable Disease and protect in-person instruction?
Immunizations	LOSD provided access to state and local vaccination clinics to eligible individuals (both staff and students).
Face Coverings	Masks are recommended if employees or students are at high risk for severe illness or if the county is at high risk. For staff or students at high risk, we recommend they have a conversation with a healthcare provider and/or take additional precautions.
Isolation	If a person has COVID-19, they must isolate themselves away from others for 5 days after the start of symptoms (or after a positive test if there are no symptoms), and no fever for 24 hours, and symptoms are improving. Each school has isolation spaces.
Symptom Screening	Students and Staff who exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 while at school will be sent home, per ODE Communicable Disease Guidelines.
COVID-19 Diagnostic Testing	LOSD will not offer diagnostic testing or screening testing for COVID-19.

OHA/ODE Recommendation(s) Layered Health and Safety Measures	Describe what mitigating measures the school will implement to reduce and respond to the spread of Communicable Disease and protect in-person instruction?
Airflow and Circulation	We are in an old building where opening windows is the best way to increase airflow and circulating.
Cohorting	Harmony has a small student body (under 40) that acts as one cohort and is split into three groups throughout the day.
Physical Distancing	Return to standard pre-COVID classroom setup with emphasis of maintaining at least 3 ft physical distancing to the extent possible.
Hand Washing	Staff and students will be trained on the importance of hand and respiratory hygiene. Hand sanitizer will be available for use upon entering District buildings, including Harmony. Students will be encouraged to wash their hands throughout the day including but not limited to after recess, before and after eating lunch and after using the restroom.
Cleaning and Disinfection	Regular cleaning procedures are implemented in all LOSD buildings including Harmony. Special attention is given to high-touch surfaces. Classroom outbreaks of COVID-19 result in comprehensive disinfection of associated areas, per CDC guidance. Disinfectant spray is available in every classroom along with microfiber cloth rags for application.
Training and Public Health Education	Staff will receive an updated COVID-19 training outlining newest safety measures and mitigation strategies to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

PRACTICING PLAN TO IMPROVE PROCESS

Training exercises are essential to preparedness ensuring individuals understand their role in a communicable disease event. Exercises can also help identify gaps in the planning, thereby building upon and strengthening the plan over time. Schools, districts, and ESDs should schedule to exercise this plan annually and when any revisions are made to update the plan. The plan, or component(s) of the plan, can be tested through conversations, practice exercises, or other activities.
